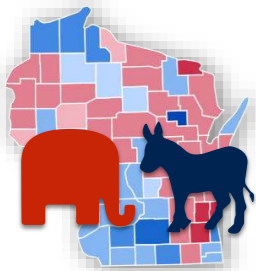

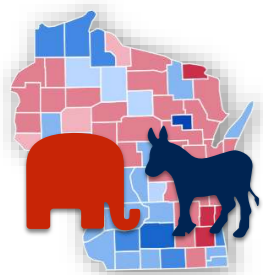

Over the past year, do you feel the economy has gotten better, worse, or stayed about the same?

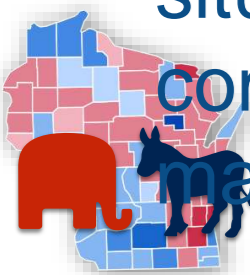

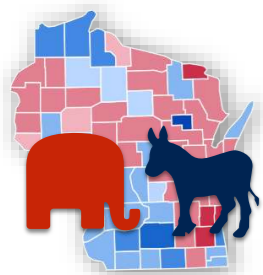

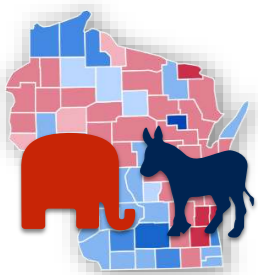




# TONY EVERS CAPTURES THE MOST VOTES OF ANY DEMOCRATIC CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNOR



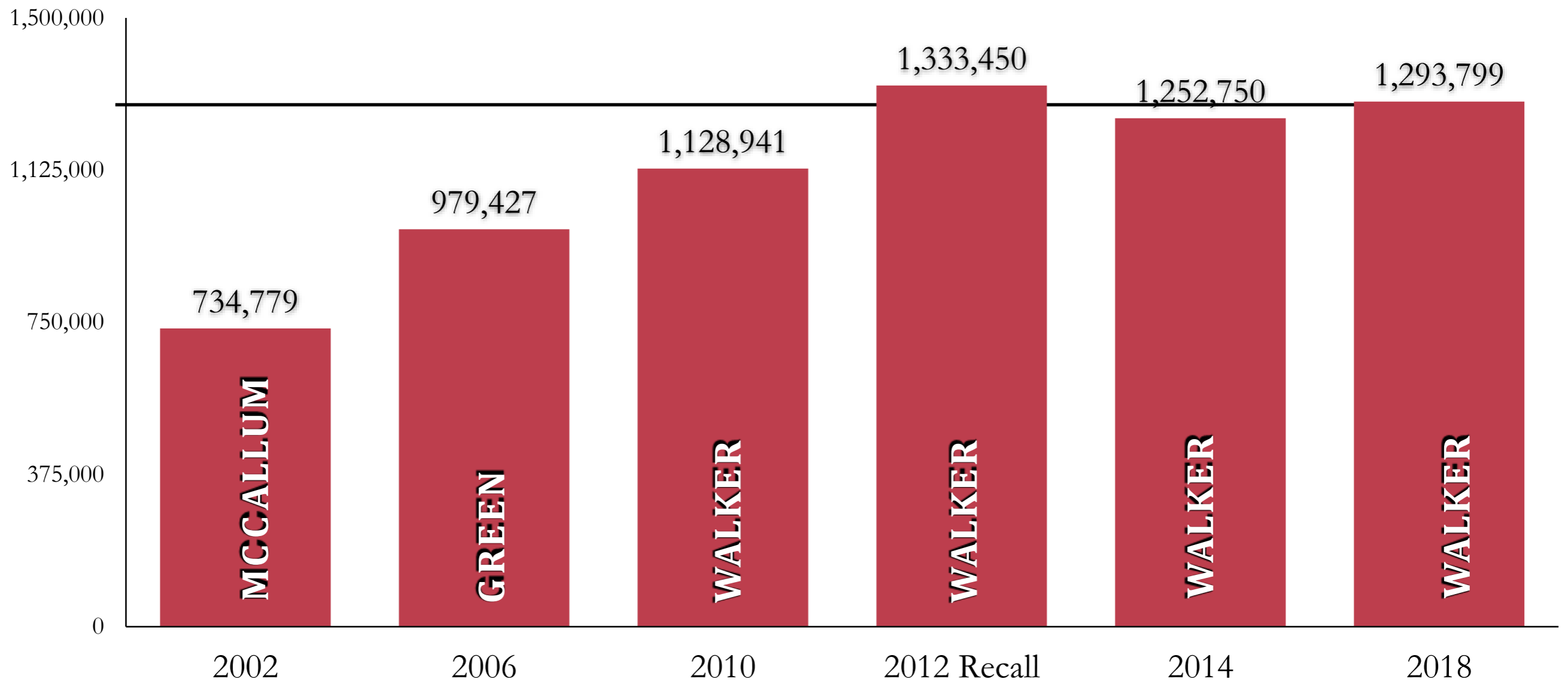

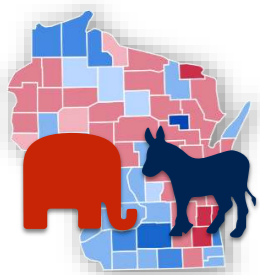


# SCOTT WALKER CAPTURES HIS SECOND MOST VOTES

## MOST VOTES FOR WALKER IN A MIDTERM

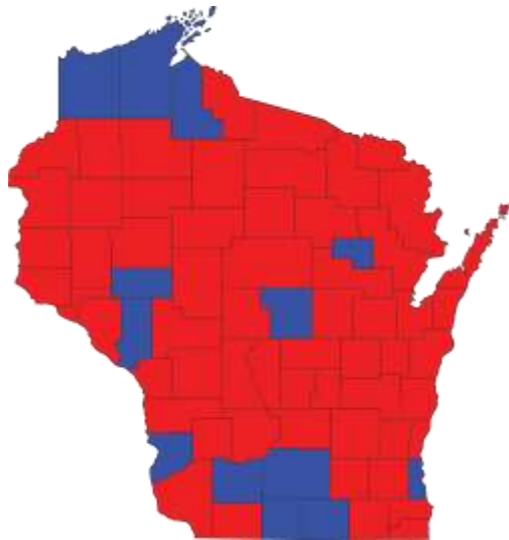

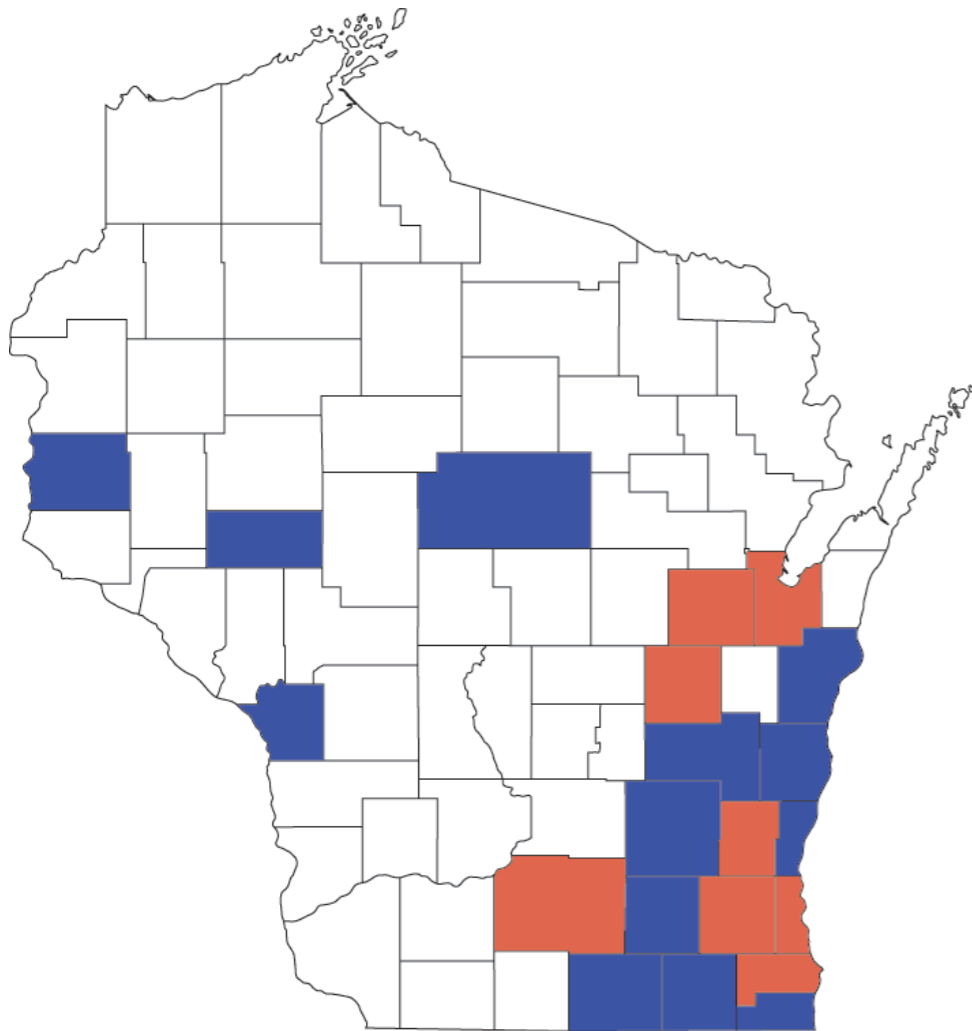
- **130,232 more votes** produced in these counties in 2018 than 2014
- **Evers received 156,223 more votes** than Gov. Walker in top 50% vote producing counties (*In 2014 Walker only trailed by 25,826 in those same counties*)
- **Milwaukee & Dane produced 69,732 more votes** in 2018 than 2014.
- **Evers beat Walker by 88,256 more votes** in Milwaukee & Dane than Burke did
- **Walker received 5,806 votes less** in these counties than 2014

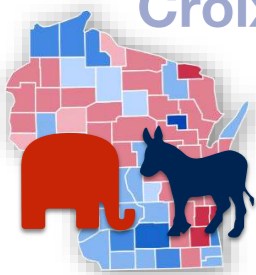

- **Evers received 99,968 more votes** than Gov. Walker in top 75% vote producing counties (*In 2014 Walker was leading by 67,626 votes in the top 75%*)
- **Evers received 175,562 more votes** than Burke in these counties
- **Walker received 5,336 votes more** in these counties than 2014

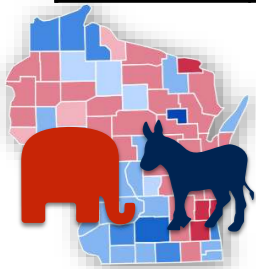
